This is now..... that was then, I started playing with the club in 1970 when I was in my 3rd year at high school, having commenced hockey in primary school. One of my primary team mates was Rowan Dick who subsequently went on to play hockey for Australia.

When I commenced we were fortunate to have several of the "greats" who I admired and respected playing, they included amongst others Arch Hardy, Brian and David Bissett, and Ian and Darrel Morrison.

When I started with the club we had two teams A grade and C Grade, we had in excess of 30 players for the 2 teams and there was no such thing as flexible interchange back then, it was a strict no train/no play policy even for C grade. My then captain was Ian Cox who went on to become a club life member, I remember as a young schoolboy that

we mostly played half a game, Ian's philosophy was that you had already played at least 1 game in schoolboys and the workers hadn't plus they paid more in subs. As a youngster I didn't necessarily agree with the philosophy however I came to use it later on in my career when I became team captain.

Not long after we grew to three teams with the establishment of an A reserve side I commenced in goals, working my way up to become A grade keeper in 1973, unfortunately my time at the top level was short lived, keepers in those days had little protective equipment, pads and kickers, a box and if you were "flash" a pair of spily cricket batting gloves, in a game against Burnie Baptist I "copped" a ball in the eye socket after that it was the beginning of the end if anything looked like it might be lifted I "ducked" back to the field and C grade it was for me.

The club has always had great camaraderie, in the seventies we enjoyed each others company and formed a cricket team called City to continue our friendship over the summer months, we went from "easybeats" at the start to BCL premiers after several years, but that's another story....

I have had a great time in hockey both on and off the field having been Club Secretary, Vice President, President, Team Captain, Selector, Premiership Coach with several of the women's teams, also North West Secretary, President, Umpires Director, Selector, Coach, State Vice President and State Under 21 selector and National Under 17 Tournament Director.

I was greatly honoured by the club in 1986 when they awarded me life membership.

I was really pleased when Iain commenced playing hockey, and I was fortunate to have played several games together with him before I retired from playing, although this may have hastened the end. I decided to retire when Iain polled more best and fairest votes for a "handful" of games in my team than I did for the whole season, mind you my vote gathering may have been hindered by providing umpires with helpful advice!

I have gained much joy, (and also some heartache), from my involvement with the club, through assisting in the development of many great juniors to the development of many long lasting friendships. I wouldn't have missed it for "quids".

The cock family involvement with the City Marians club started in the late sixties when Glen started playing in the "A" reserve roster at the Upper Burnie grounds as a freckled faced auburn haired 12 year old schoolboy who would walk to the grounds in the morning play high school hockey and then fill in his time by helping people like Arch Hardy and others sell juice and cordial drinks from the boot of a car (no canteen in those days) to raise club funds while waiting for the men to start in the afternoon, the only way for a club to recruit for the future was to access juniors from the schools roster.

He was soon followed by his younger brothers Ron and Graeme and there has been some ongoing family representation with the club until today, The family members have helped in many club roles ranging from patron, president to coaching and playing and co-ordinating juniors and this has involved their mother, wives, sons and daughter whom have all achieved some representation at state level and higher with Glen and Jill's son Geoff playing and at one stage captaining the Australian u/21's against Korea doing the club proud.

With the combining of City and Marians the hockey fraternity have enjoyed some great chemistry match's and this family have benefited with Glen from City and Jill from Marian's being one of the first couples to spring from the amalgamation and the club rewarded both with life membership.

The families greatest club moments have probably been when the brothers Glen and Ron were both integral members of the golden era of the hockey clubs 13 year reign as NWAH premiers that also included six state titles.

Some great hockey traits that were in the game at that stage that are no longer used were the three touch bully at the start of the game and after every goal, the roll the ball in from the sideline by hand, the stopping of penalty corner hit-out by hand, the ability to catch the ball that was raised in the air and dropping it straight back to the playing surface and in those days the ball was a seamed leather ball also the substitution rule of when subbed off you took no further part in the game and the best rule to be removed from the game was when offside was taken from play.

Playing the game for the club week in and week out is only a small part of the reason why it continues to keep all the family coming back, it's the lifelong friendships and respect created and enjoyed not only with your teammates but your opponents that give the greatest satisfaction to everyone.

## GONINON

The Goninon history with City began when Richard (Dick) Goninon, who played in the first ever hockey game in Tasmania in 1934 and made the first state side in 1935, made a comeback to hockey in 1968 with City at the 'youthful' age of 53 and played as goalie in 'A' grade in a year dominated by 'the bloods'. In the semi-final the umpire had blown the whistle to award City a free and, as Dick picked up the ball to throw it out of the goal area, an opposition player belatedly swung at the ball, resulting in 2 broken fingers on Dick's right hand. Not to be denied, Dick played in the grand final with the aid of a heavily padded glove, and the boys had a sweet victory. Two weeks later, Dick was in agony at the wedding of his son Graeme, as family and friends shook his right hand (with the broken fingers).

Graeme Goninon played 380 games with the club – a couple of seasons at Div 1 level and most of his career with Div 2 captaining them to coastal and state premierships. Graeme is a life member of the club, and was heavily involved in administration, serving terms as Treasurer and President. He also served as President of the North West Hockey Association. He still maintains involvement with the club as Auditor and Patron.

In a major coup for hockey, Dick and Graeme met with Burnie Mayor Rex Collins about some concerns with a new hockey centre being planned on the old tip site in West Park Grove. This resulted in a community meeting attended by local and state politicians and businessmen and hockey clubs. From that meeting, council offered a site (now known as McKenna Park) along Three Mile Line. It was

an ambitious venture. Graeme was appointed inaugural chair of McKenna Park Fundraising Committee. The rest is history.

Dick's younger son, Leon Goninon, debuted with the club at a very early age, and quickly established himself as a top class defender. Leon is one of the most decorated members in the history of the club. He played and coached at Div 1 level for many years, being a key factor in a very successful period for the club. Leon won club and Association B & F awards and was a state player for 6 consecutive years. He has also coached our women's teams. Leon is the games record holder for the club, having played more than 700 games. He is a life member and is still playing Div 3.

Graeme's daughter Petrina (now Birtwistle) was the smallest player in the club when she started and soon picked up the nickname 'Pee Wee' – has played close to 400 games mostly in Div 1 and won a range of club awards both on and off the field. She has also been a hard worker for the club. Petrina's husband – Jason – is also a club member with more than 300 games played.

Graeme's sons Trent and Curtis have both come up through U/18's with the club, and have enjoyed the more social aspect of the club, having a hit with the 3's.

The 'Goninon' future with CMHC looks secure with Tailey (Graeme's granddaughter) Macy (Leon's daughter) and Brody (Petrina's son) all playing school hockey.

## HAWKINS

The Hawkins history with City Marians began in 1979 when Janine joined the Marians. Recruited by Coach Ross Cameron she played on field in B, A Res and A Grade, participating in numerous finals and winning the occasional award for on field or administration. In 1995, after a few weeks playing as kicking back due to the lack of a goalie, Janine offered to play in goals as well, but on the proviso that she could play in another grade on the field. This has allowed her to amass 584 field games as well as 281 games in goals over the last 32 years and she holds the record for the most field games by a female.

One of her memorable moments was travelling to Queenstown in the early 80's to play a round robin series against some of the West coast sides. The locals laughingly apologised that they hadn't rolled the pitch!! It was a gravel pitch and quite an experience having to dig the ball out of the loose stones.

Janine was awarded life membership of City Marians in 1997 and is also a life member of the Burnie Districts Hockey Association. She was President of City Marians from 1997 – 1999 as well as involved in other administrative roles including vice president, treasurer and statistician. She has been the Burnie Districts Administrator for a number of years as well as doing the statistics, publicity and administration for the North West Region, and representing the coast on various State Wide committees. She has been a City Marians committee member since 2001.

Janine's children Clayton, Rebecca and Jonathon all came up through the junior ranks of City Marians. Being around hockey all their lives they played juniors from an early age. Janine coached U13s from 1995 – 1997 and then continued to be involved as Junior Co-ordinator. Clayton played juniors from 1990 – 96 plus 2 years in the seniors.

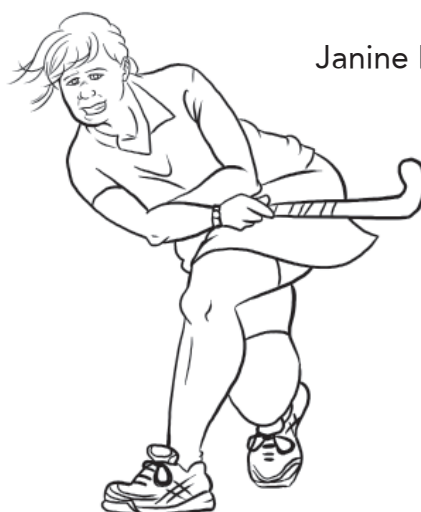
Rebecca commenced in U13 in 1996 at 10 years of age and started in seniors in 1998 playing A Res and A grade with her mother until moving

up to GNL in 2008. She is 10th on the Games played list for City having amassed 275 senior games. She was selected in the U16 State side in 2002 and was the Association's top goal scorer for A Grade women in 2007. Rebecca coached the A Reserve side in 2009 as well as assisting with Publicity and compiling the games statistics for the association.

Jonathon wanted to play hockey as soon as he could hold a stick, but had to wait until he was 7 to play his first U13 game in 1997. He played another 6 years in u13 helping out in other Grades and started seniors in Div 3 in 2004. Both Jonathon and Rebecca were keen to play U15 at an early age, but due to the number of other club players they were not able to. What they were able to do along with other keen U13s was to join with Burnie Baptist to assist them to put an U15 team into the NW Competition. Jonathon coached the U13s in 2006 and was one of the youngest City Marians committee members 2004/2005. He also assisted in umpiring in all grades and went away to officiate the National U13s in 2007. Jonathon moved to Hobart to attend University in 2009, totalled 143 senior games with the club.

Probably the best year on the field was 2005. Rebecca and Janine were both part of consecutive A Grade women's Premiership Teams, while Jono was part of the Div 2 Men and U18 Premiership sides.

Hockey was born and bred into the Lamprey boy's. Both Ellis and Patricia were hockey players, even marrying under a hockey stick guard of honour.

Ellis played for City in his younger years, playing with Arch Hardy and making State teams in his youth and as veteran in his later years. He even played Vets in the over 60's for ACT because Tasmania didn't have the numbers to field a side. Ellis often told the story of Arch piling half a team in his mini to go to the games, liking it to the circus trick done by clowns. How many bodies and hockey gear will fit in a mini?

Instrumental in assisting with fundraising for City Marians when each hockey club had to raise funds toward McKenna Park complex, Ellis donated a car to be raffled. He would offer his hand where ever required, even to the extent of keeping a set of gear in his vehicle right through his hockey career just in case any team was short a player. Although he often commented that if he had to lend it to someone, they would have trouble keeping up with it! Ellis was a coach, mentor, committee member and Life Member and on many occasions was head chef of the bbq.

Whilst the boy's started their club hockey at Baptist, Tony was the first to make the move to the bloods in the early eighties, with the rest of the family joining the ranks of the red and white in the following seasons. While Terry and Stephen mainly played the lower divisions, Shane and Tony played Division 1 and 2. Both Shane and Tony played in an under 21 colt team.

Tony had a reputation on the field for being able to control the ball holding onto his stick with his left hand and run the wing. Tony coached at both club and North West level.

Shane however was a force to be reckoned with in the goals and was feared by many an attacker. He assisted many a win that went to penalty strokes. He was well respected by his team mates which showed when he won the club's best and fairest on more than one occasion, quite a feat for a goalie.

Due to the involvement with the club of the male Lamprey gender, it seemed taking on the role of Secretary was a way for Allison to be involved as she had never played the sport. That did change when our women's teams were struggling for numbers but it was frustrating to have watched the sport for so many years and knowing what should happen in the mind and it not quite happening with the stick. Club achievement has been rewarded to Allison on more than one occasion and in 2009 she was honoured in receiving Life Membership.

The next generation Adam and Hayden has seen the Lamprey name continue within the club. Hayden could hit a hockey ball before he could walk whilst Adam has been truly dedicated to the sport. They have both won Best and Fairest and Most Potential awards and played at division one level. The boys have been chosen in North West and State teams. Adam has been lucky enough to travel to every State in Australia thanks to hockey, not only as a player but as an umpire for Tasmania.

A proud moment as a parent has been when Adam was asked to play with another club and his reply was "sorry, Pop wouldn't be happy if I played with another club". What great ways to sum up club and family loyalty and the impact all families have on our club and it's continuance for future generations!

I first started playing with City Marians in 1981 in C grade as back then there wasn't a junior competition. I was playing high school hockey and one of my mates who I was playing with suggested that myself and another one of my friend's should come along and have a hit. The first training that we went to was a bit daunting as when we turned up there were around 40 men there but it didn't take long to feel welcome. Unfortunately I can't remember many of the players who were in my first team but I can remember one, it was a guy they called Rosco (Ross Cameron). We played at some interesting places such as Sheffield, West Ulverstone Primary School, Somerset Soccer grounds as they are now, the grass grounds across from Meercroft Park and of course our home ground at Upper Burnie. The next year I moved up into A Reserve (Div.2) which was a very big step but it was made easier with the guidance of then senior coach Ian Morrison who was playing in A Reserve.

In my early years with the club I was lucky enough to be coached by some of the best such as Ian Morrison, Tony Jago, David Bissett, Glen Cock, Wayne Garland and Leon Goninon. I can remember training at Upper Burnie when we were lucky enough to actually train on the ground (quite often we couldn't due to the condition of the ground i.e. MUD). The trainings we used to do involved a run for at least an hour before going onto the ground; this was mainly up and down Mount Street or up and down all of the nice hills around Upper Burnie. When we couldn't train on the ground we used to train in the car park which lent itself to some very interesting situations but made you pass on the ball a lot and not hang onto it.

When McKenna Park was chosen to be the site for hockey in Burnie it required many hours of volunteer work to be carried out. The members of City Marians were very forthcoming with their time and energy in assisting with all kinds of duties, my favourite would have to have been the countless hours of picking up rocks and also the painting of all the change rooms. It was worthwhile because we all knew it would be of huge benefit to all future players.

1987 was an up and down year for our family as it started with the unfortunate death of Rohan Summers who was not just a fellow club person but the husband of my sister Karen. It also was the year for the club's Golden Jubilee; for everyone who was involved with the club at that time will surely agree with me in saying it was a fantastic year of celebrations. Rohan had played 103 games with the club up until then and was a very

respected member, not just with our club but with all clubs that knew him. Karen began playing with the club in 1988 going on to play 152 games and also making several state teams. Karen then met and went on to marry Simon Arthur. Simon played 221 games with the club from 1987; he also made several state teams at both junior and senior level. Simon was also president of the club in 1994. Karen and Simon moved to Launceston for work commitments with their two children Kieron and Ashleigh. Kieron and Ashleigh also took up hockey in Launceston with both of them going on to play for the state. Kieron has also had the honour of playing for Australia at U/21 level which was last year in Malaysia. Ashleigh was also chosen to play for Australia in the U/17 age group which competed this year in Brisbane.

After my first year in C grade and my second year in A Reserve all the rest of my years have been playing A Grade (Div.1). My games played to the end of 2011 was 561. I represented the state in U/14, U/17 and U/21's. During my time playing Div. 1, I was lucky enough to win several premierships but as the years roll they become harder and harder to win so I always tell the younger guys that if you win a Div. 1 premiership you should savour the moment because it won't be something that you will forget. I have also coached the senior men on and off on several occasions, I coached the GNW for 2 years. The club also gave me the greatest honour within the club in giving me a life membership in 2004. I have also been a committee member on several occasions and I am currently on this year's committee.

Since my son Linden began playing U/13's five years ago at the age of 9 my interest has shifted to coaching juniors. Myself and David Kenworthy took over coaching the U/13's four years ago and I must say it was an easy transition as Glen and Jill Cock had done a fantastic job in getting the junior numbers to where they were. Linden has made the state U/12 team on three occasions with his last year in that age group as captain. He also made the state U/13 team last year and is now waiting to find out if he has made the U/15 team. Linden is currently playing junior and senior Div. 2 hockey with the odd Div. 1 game which is a great feeling playing alongside your son. After 32 years of playing hockey I am continually asked about when I am going to retire but I have many more years left in me to play our great game called "hockey".

# The Game that is . . .

With the change of the century came some changes to our sport.

Major changes occurred in 1994 as goalkeepers were required to wear protective headgear and in 1996 goalkeeper's gauntlets were renamed hand protectors with length and width requirements. Wearing of a muzzle became optional. The offside rule was abolished but a player couldn't stand on the goal line or intentionally run behind either goal.

A major change of the times occurred in 1998 when metric measurements and distances were adopted and substitution was not permitted at a penalty corner except for injury.

An experimental rule in 1999 allowed the use of the edge of the stick, subject to safety considerations and was formally adopted in 2002. Penalty corners were allowed to be taken at half and after the full time whistle. The hockey stick became lighter with composites being used in their making with no metal being allowed, so for those who know him, it was most upsetting for one of our players who used to put a lead weight in his wooden stick.

The field took on a major change in 2000 with the broken white line five metres from the edge of the circle being implemented.

The hockey stick changed immensely taking on more precise specifications including size, shape, weight and the material used to make the stick.

With the game becoming faster, major rule changes have also been implemented;

2003 saw the ball only needing to go outside of the circle (not stopped dead) before a shot on goal could be taken.

In 2007 the option of playing with a goalkeeper or playing with 11 field players was added to the rule changes which implemented interesting tactics being pursued in certain circumstances.

Assisting with the speed of the game, 2009 became interesting with an auto play or self-pass rule entering the competition from a free hit. It was introduced to encourage free flowing hockey. The other rule that players struggled to adjust too was the hockey ball not being able to be hit directly into the circle in the attacking circle. It was an experimental rule but remains in the rules at this stage.

And as if it isn't difficult enough being a defender, in 2010 a defender breaking on a penalty corner is sent to the centre line.

**Balm anyone . . .** Playing a semi-final in Launceston on their clay was always a challenging experience but just before half time Sav Anderson slides along the turf shedding skin from about 8 inches of his thigh. As we are having our half time talk he quickly asks Porky to put on some cooling foam to try and stop it from hardening up. Just as he does the coach starts to make a special point to Sav about a job to do in the second half. Porky's seen to be showing Rocky some friars balm he's pulled from the first aid kit and with grins from ear to ear lavishly applies it to the affected area and begins to rub it in. In 2006 he was selected in the Australian U/21 team to play a 5 game test series in August against Korea

in Canberra where he was appointed a team co-captain and scored 10 goals in 4 games and received an award from hockey Australia for his achievement.

At the youth Olympics in Sydney in 2007 at Homebush stadium he was a member of the gold medal winning side that defeated Great Britain after a penalty stroke shoot out in which Geoff scored both his first stroke and second sudden death stroke for success.

In 2008 he played with the Australian Institute of Sport (AIS) against India in Brisbane and toured China in the same year.

Geoff moved to Perth in 2010 to join the Hale Hockey Club and in his first season helped Hale to win their first premiership in 100 years.

At the moment he is playing hockey with his brother Steven and David Guest at Hale. In the last 2 years he has been overseas playing in Holland with Schaerweijde and this year with Belgium club Racing in the European Hockey League.
